SASS April 2023

This has been a quiet month with not many of you getting out shooting. Hopefully now that it is starting to get warmer and the game season has passed there will be a few more SASS guns out on Sunday mornings. We did six shoots this month including the charity shoot at Wallers Ash which was not scored as it was on a Saturday. Your committee also had a meeting this month to discuss whether to have a simulated game day and a weekend away as so many asked for at the AGM. We have experienced queues at some shoots due to the number of local venues sadly diminishing. This has also forced us to go further afield to fill the calendar. Hangmans Stone and Barbury were more challenging but those who shot had an enjoyable time.

Hangmans Stone, 2nd April

Five guns showed up at the Arms and all travelled together driven kindly by Unick. It was a little over an hour to drive to the shoot in the Berkshire countryside, just north of Newbury. At the shoot we found Big Mack who had driven up on his own, Unick did enquire whether he had any friends, wellbeing, being paramount in clubs and associations nowadays. The ground was reminiscent of the Hensting Lane shoot to members that have shot there. We split into two, three-gun squads for this hundred bird shoot of ten five pair stands. There were two more stands that were not included and we saw several towers that were not in use but had traps covered over. It looks like they mix it about a bit at this ground which we have overlooked for many years. That said, it was clear to see that the locals had their eyes in on the more challenging stands than we did. The tower on stand eleven evaded all but the best SASS guns. This is a lovely ground and well worth shooting more often, preferably when the sun is shining and the wind is not blowing. Well done to Pikey and Big Mac for both coming first with handicap. Under the new rules we are no longer splitting boxes so the Sunday 25 cartridges go to Pikey with the highest actual 38/50.

Well done to Hunter for winning the Sunday 25 cartridges and to Robbo with best actual of 36/50 and for holding Sturats place whilst he was having an off day.

Petersfield, 16th April

Seven guns from SASS attended the sixty-bird shoot. This beautiful spring morning at the Arms got progressively wetter as we drove towards the shoot. There was some deliberation regarding waterproofs, Badger took one for the team and wore his so that, sods law, it would stay dry. It dried up by the time the hooter was sounded at ten thirty. We shot as two groups but suffered delays by others not splitting into smaller squads. The stands were all in the usual places, but the layout was mixed about which was enjoyable. This is very much a close in shoot with little scope for distance clays but there were some cleverly levelling targets. Everyone shot above their handicap and with the exception of Sturat with the highest actual 43/50, well done Sturat, the actual scores were all within two kills. Four guns with the same number, one with one under and one, one under again. Big Mack was using a new gun, so really well done to him for being so close to the field and pipping Sturat at the post with handicap. The actual scores are always posted on the website.




