SASS March 2023

Chalky Hill, 26th February

On this cold but sunny February morning eight guns attended the fifty-bird shoot at Chalky Hill. Numbers were up because of the very sudden closure of the Botley shoot. The eight were joined by a prospective member from Botley who we picked up on the first stand. We shot as two squads. It was quite a bit busier than expected, especially as this was the last shoot day at Gosport and Lee. Well done to Big Mack and Unick for winning the Sunday 25 cartridges and to Sturat for the highest actual 40/50.

Bisley, 5th March

Five guns went to Bisley on this overcast and slightly chilly morning. We shot a hundred clays as one squad and halved the scores for the Sunday 25s. As usual there was no queueing at Bisley. Seventeen of the twenty-two stands and every trap on each stand were utilised. We did not make it easy for ourselves but the challenging shoot was great fun with lots of banter. Unick and Robbo were particularly competitive and ended up drawing seventy each with their actual kills. Badger had a cartridge malfunction in the Grouse Butt which left the wad in the barrel on his penultimate pair. Unick offered his gun for the remaining targets but Badger declined and cleared the obstruction with a stick and continued the stand to win the cartridges for the day. Highest actual was Sturat with 41/50, well done both. The after-shoot beer and pie supplied by Robbo and Denise were well appreciated, thank you both. The proceedings were all finished before midday but we were a little late back at the Arms because we got stuck behind a house on Winchester Road.

Willoughby Hedge, 12th March

A good show for SASS at this shoot with twelve guns in attendance split into three groups for this hundred bird shoot. A very testing layout by the Sommerset team with nothing the same as last time we shot there. Some confusion at the start because the shoot does not put any signs out, so we had to work out for ourselves how many on each stand. After marking the cards for alternating three and four pairs like last time, we established that there were twelve stands so ten stands of four pairs and the last two with five pairs. This shoot is not only further away but at a different level and there were some very testing clays. We did see Unick dragging half a tree to stand two behind us and later found the pokey stick still lodged in the stand for a cartridge malfunction again this week. We do seem to be getting more of these lately. Hopefully not a trend, because the results of not recognising such events could be catastrophic. Well done to Pikey for winning the cartridges and being the only gun that shot to his handicap on this difficult layout. Well done Sturat for the best actual of 41/50.



Shooting Times reported on 11th March that "Proposed changes to the licensing regime would see shotguns treated as strictly as Section 1 firearms". In the Independent Office for Police Conduct (IOPC) report on the tragic Plymouth shooting where five people were killed. Despite acknowledging that the issuing of murderer Jake Davidson's initial licence was "attributable to a lack training, supervision inadequate force processes" and that the officers who issued his licence renewal should face disciplinary action, the report suggests sweeping changes to firearms licensing anyway. The proposed changes include making the licensing regime for shotguns as strict as that for Section 1 firearms, such as rifles. Under this change, shotguns would need to be individually listed and all ammunition would have to appear





CPSA response to triple barrelled shotguns

It is certainly unusual to see these tri-barrel guns on clay grounds and our advice would be to treat it the same as if someone was using a semi-auto and loading three shells and that is against the ground rules and not acceptable. CPSA Safety rules state that only two cartridges should ever be loaded in a semi-auto and the same will apply here. You should report it to the shoot organiser if you are not the designated safety officer and I would expect the person to be told not to load 3 cartridges and if they persist to be asked to leave the ground.

QA Charity Shoot, Wallers Ash

Pete has recently had a kidney transplant at QA hospital and the family want to give something back to QA renal unit and the Fareham dialysis team. We will be supporting this event as a club for a one-off Saturday and will still be shooting at Chalky Hill on the 23rd for the Sunday 25s.
