Another shoot that comes to mind is Nations Farm, this was on the Botley to Bishops Waltham Road. If you are travelling from Botley to Bishops Waltham, just past the house where the dummy is hanging out of the window on the right, there is a farm house with a long drive. In the field behind there were bales of straw laid down marking out the stands (very primitive). All the stands were hand operated so when it was raining the operator got rather wet, but it was a start. Then that was shut down and the shoot moved to Curdridge down the lane pass the Cricketers pub. This was a better venue as it had a small lake to shoot over. That kept going for a few years then the owner of the land the other side of the lake kicked up because he developed the ground as a small holding and his customers complained about all the shot in the cabbages, so that was the end of that. Then there was Wallers Ash, Wallers Ash was originally near, Martyr Worthy. If you take the road as if you were going to Wallers Ash as we know it today, right opposite the pub the cart and horses there is a right turn to Martyr Worthy. About 2 miles down the road on the left is a church St Swithuns with a lane alongside, up there was the shoot. It was quite small you more or less shot inside a circle shooting out. I took an American there and he was amazed saying we do not have anything like this in the states. Wallers started to get too big for the shoot so they moved to where they are
