When we arrived at the Four Counties Shooting Ground, Big Mac and Fries were already there. Funny, the clubhouse breakfast makes this the only regular shoot that Big Mac arrives before everyone else. It was a very challenging hundred bird shoot coupled with wind. No-one shot to their handicap. There were a few no-birds and the trap at stand four where one of the two squads started, moved. After a while more and more clays hit the tree by the trap and by the time Robbo shot there was not a single pair without a no-bird. They threw a few battues into the mix this time which proved difficult for us visitors but the regulars showed us how to do it (after we had shot). Well done to Fries for joint first, winning the Sunday 25s by one shot more than Robbo and beating Big Mac by one too. Highest actual was Sturat again, this being a tough one it was only a 39/50. The drizzle started again as we drove back to the arms for a well-earned pint.

HSE requests (again), more time for its review on lead ban

The Health and Safety Executive (HSE) has requested that the timeline be extended for the final stage of its lead ammunition review in England, Wales and Scotland. The move comes following the HSE consultation in December on the socio-economic assessment of restriction proposals. The HSE has submitted a request to the Government asking for more time to sort through relevant information and evidence, before it can propose its recommendations to the Secretary of State for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs. A new timeline is being drawn up and will be published following consultation with policy leads, such as Defra and the Scottish and Welsh. Extending the timeline for further review may be beneficial for the shooting community. In recent months industry campaigners and expert evidence have often apparently been ignored on related public consultations. The latest public consultation, which ended at midnight on 10 December, focused on reducing the transition period away from lead shot and the potential inclusion of lead rifle ammunition for live quarry in the ban. The shooting community has been campaigning for a voluntary transition away from lead shot and single-use plastics for live quarry shooting over a five-year period.

Below is an update on shotgun license applications and renewals from Chief Inspector Louise Hubble, who has been involved in countryside policing for many years, & now is Head of Hampshire Constabulary's Firearms Licensing Department (Rural Times, Winter 2023-24)

"Our focus has to be on the areas that carry the most risk, and ultimately new applicants carry lower risk as they do not currently possess a firearm. That is why it's imperative we deal with renewals first. We have to ensure that the person renewing their certificate is still safe to possess a gun, and we also must process the renewal applications before the certificate expires to ensure the individual is not left in possession of a firearm illegally. I can appreciate this can cause frustration for those who are experiencing a delay in their application process, but ultimately public safety will always be our priority. Firearms are weapons that can cause serious harm even when possessed lawfully - we want to make sure that does not happen."

Petersfield, 18th February

Hunter was getting some end of season hunting in up-country, so did not shoot at Gunners Wood on this drizzly Sunday morning. It turned out to be a lovely hunting day on the Oxfordshire/Northamptonshire border. Only three guns went to Petersfield, no idea what the weather was like though.
